"Hawaii Green Business" Program Expands to Include Office and Retail Recognition

The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii in partnership with the Department of Business Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) and the Department of Health established the *Hawaii Green Business* program in 2003. The program's objective is to have businesses focus on reducing energy and water consumption, promote recycling, prevent pollution, reduce emissions, and to educate employees and customers about environmental practices. The *Hawaii Green Business Awards* program then recognizes the businesses that go beyond environmental compliance, to reduce, reuse, and recycle as well as restore and conserve Hawaii's culture, natural resources and the environment. Since 2003, awards have been presented to businesses, such as the Hilton Hawaiian Village Beach Resort & Spa, Waikiki Beach Resort & Spa and the Hawaii Prince Hotel among others. The program has now expanded to include office and retail.
